

AUGUST 2021 TRUST REVIEW SUMMER SCHOOL SOUTH LINCOLNSHIRE ACADEMIES TRUST (SLAT) BOURNE ACADEMY / SPALDING ACADEMY / GILES ACADEMY

The South Lincolnshire Academies Trust (SLAT), that includes three non-selective mixed secondary schools in Lincolnshire, being Bourne Academy, Spalding Academy and Giles Academy, welcomed in excess of 370 new Year 7 students to our Summer School event, for a week of activities. Each and every the new Year cohort in all three schools were invited to participate in the Summer School, with disadvantaged students prioritised. All students that applied for this event were accommodated with a place and it proved to be extremely popular in all three Trust schools.

Each of the three schools followed a programme of study comprising of five themed days. The Summer School aimed to bridge the gap of missed learning due disruption caused by the COVID pandemic and was also set up to give the students a sense of belonging and to familiarise themselves with the schools and the school staff. The five themes of Time, Space, Treasure Island, The Environment and Games allowed students to take part in Maths, English, Science, History and Geography sessions throughout the week. Each day also included a personal social health education (PSHE) session and finished with a practical session.

Students enthusiastically built and buried time capsules, made and launched rockets, worked their way round an orienteering course and composed a music using recyclable litter. These activities enables them to explore probability, aero dynamics, compass skills, magnetic force and the greenhouse effect. The aim was also to support these learners to also improve their reading, literacy and communication skills and a particular success was introducing the new Year 7 learners to new literature texts, including Treasure Island, by Robert Louis Stevenson, Alice Through the Looking Glass, by Lewis Carol and Time Capsule by Katie Clemons. The students were given the opportunity to create their own writing influenced by the themes and styles of writing of these famous authors.

On the final day, the students were treated to an awards afternoon and were presented with a variety of awards for activities in which they excelled, including presentation shields cups and all manner of goodies! The awards given included, Best Creative Writing, Fastest Orienteerer, Best Junk Funk band, Best Flying Rocket. The climax of the week was that all students were rewarded for their efforts with time on an inflatable assault course, playing football and rounders and even taking part in a game of Giant Jenga ... including out skilling the staff in all these activities! Finally, the students had one last surprise when an ice cream van arrived to reward all the students and staff for their wonderful efforts over the week.

We have received extremely positive feedback from parents/carers, students and staff for how this week was organised and the benefit it brought to all students. Everyone received a SLAT Summer School T-Shirt, which they wore throughout the week and this helped the students to feel there was a group and common identity. The students also loved being presented with their SLAT Summer School water bottle, to encourage the reusing of plastics. As well as these items, the students eagerly received copies of all books studied, compasses, magnets, mini greenhouses ... and much more to take home so that they could continue their learning. Many students (and staff) commented that one of their favourite parts of the day included the break snacks and lunch! Outstanding food was all provided by the SLAT in-house catering teams.

In summary, the SLAT Summer School event in all three secondary schools – Bourne Academy; Spalding Academy; Giles Academy, was a resounding success, welcoming a significant number of our new Year 7 students in to our school communities. Due to the disruption caused by the COVID pandemic, for the majority of students this was the first time they had set foot in their new school, and to have this Summer School opportunity has enabled them to have a tour of the school site and familiarise themselves with their new surroundings, to meet and work with key members of teaching and non-teaching support, to ask any questions that they may have regarding what life is like at their new school and to eliminate any worries or concerns. All students behaved fantastically well and produced some outstanding pieces of work.

We are very proud of SLAT's new Year 7 cohort and look forward to welcoming them and the rest of our school community back to school in September 2021.
